Bryn Mawr Members Per Capita Why?

In addition to your Annual Pledge to Bryn Mawr Presbyterian Church each member is assigned a Per Capita amount to be paid to the Presbytery to support all of their activities throughout the year. This year's Per Capita is \$36.30 per member. As of May 31st, only 42% of the total Bryn Mawr pays out to the Presbytery has been received. The Church Treasurer has already paid our Annual Contribution to the Presbytery even though we haven't collected even half of that total to date. The amount due from our church is based on our membership at the end of the prior year. The Presbytery breaks out the payment as follows: the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church receives \$9.80; the Synod of Lakes and

Prairies receives \$5.50, and John Knox Presbytery receives \$21.00.

John Knox Presbytery is made up of 55 congregations that are doing ministry, with each other and for each other in ways they simply couldn't do alone. Every Presbyterian shares in the benefit of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) and the expenses associated with coordinating and performing their functions are shared by every member as well.

To summarize, your Session has agreed to pay John Knox Presbytery our requested Per Capita for 2024 whether or not we have received those funds from our members. So, if you have already paid your Per Capita for 2024, Thank You! If you haven't paid it yet the Session would greatly appreciate you doing so sooner rather than later this year.

Made New

On March 2nd, I attended the "Made New Women's Conference" at Crosspoint Community Church in Oconomowoc, WI. The speakers were Laura Sandretti, Shanthini Baskaran, and Rachel Inouye. I was very moved as I sat in the audience and listened to these women praise God and give him glory. Songs were sung accompanied by a four-piece band. All three speakers were very inspirational. They referenced bible verses often and had the gift of entertaining the audience while telling moving stories. God's love was shared, and we prayed together.

Shanthini had the most unusual story about how her family, living in India, were Christians. When her great-grandmother was young, she was married to an old rich man that had many wives. When her husband died, his family wanted to burn her on his funeral pyre (called Sati) even though it was outlawed at the time. A Christian family rescued her great-grandmother and introduced her

to the love of Jesus. That act of kindness from the Christian family changed the trajectory of her family's future religion. She switched from Hindu to Christianity, which is a small minority in India, making up 2.3% of the population.

Since attending this conference, I began listening to Rachel Inouye's Podcast called The Real Deal. I started with her first Podcast from 1/8/2019 where she interviewed her father who taught her to always be the real deal. Don't try to be someone else, be yourself. I have listened to all episodes from the first to 2/15/2022. She does an excellent job interviewing Christian men and women that talk about God in their lives. She ends the Podcast with prayer which I find very inspiring. I will continue listening to Rachel and eventually will have listened to all her episodes.

Since attending this conference and listening to the Real Deal Podcast, I find I am praying more. I have seen prayer work in my everyday life when I found an assisted living home for my mom so quickly. I feel more connected to the Lord. Like the title of the conference, I feel like I am "made new".

Achieving Peace

When an individual lacks inner peace, domestic harmony is affected. When domestic harmony is lost, peace amongst neighbors too thins out. In this manner, when the inner peace of an individual is lost, the family, neighborhood, country and the world too start losing their peaceful atmosphere. Persons and groups lacking peace of mind hang on to nationality, language, religion,

politics, ethics, groups, high status, low positions, etc, and engage themselves in anti-social acts of crime, terrorism and war.

We believe the only way to achieve peace is to cultivate individual and collective inner peace. It is not possible to achieve peace by speeches laden with sentiments, slogan shouting rallies, using weapons, blaming one another and arousing mob feelings. Neither minds tarnished with anger and ill will, nor loading people with political compromises, will bring in peace. Hatred cannot be overcome with hatred. War is not a path to peace. "The armed get destroyed by arms." There is a wonderful potential and strength in our minds - thoughts in the proper direction help achieve self-composure.

A well-developed mind - not subservient to five sense activity, not missing proper direction, not falling prey to undesirable influence, thereby being successful in personal life and promoting peace among people - is achieved through meditation. Persons who have developed their minds through meditation are constantly in a proper state of mind, and the spiritual aura emanating from pure thoughts influences others also.

We have to set apart some time daily for meditation in order to lead successful lives individually, as families, and as members of a community. Life devoid of meditation is limited to five sense activity and lacks essence. It is a life which brings no good to oneself or to the society. It only brings sorrow. When a very large number of persons congregate with composure of mind and body, and engage in meditation walks and mass peace meditations, the power of the spiritual energy generated makes our minds peaceful and calm. This helps us to set aside the thoughts of greed, to cultivate thoughts of selfless service, to stop being hateful, and to extend loving kindness towards all; to destroy narrow, selfish unwholesome thoughts and thereby to make the mind recipient of wisdom unmatched.
